TO: All parents of pupils attending Bernards Township Public Schools and Bernardsville Senior High School

FROM: Board of Education and the Office of Civilian Defense and Disaster Control

RE: Dispersal of school pupils in case of an Air Defense Emergency

In January 1958, all parents of pupils attending Bernards Township Schools, including Bernardsville High School, were informed of a Directive issued by the State Department of Defense, directing dispersal of school populations in an Air Defense Emergency. Since schools generally are vulnerable to the blast and thermal effects of nuclear weapons, it has been decided to adopt a policy calling for the dismissal of school populations where warning time permits. Dismissal of school pupils will reduce the hazard of blast injuries and nuclear contamination of large groups of children in one area and preserve small family units, wherein parents can adopt protection, housing, and feeding measures as time and conditions will permit.

The State Department of Defense informs us, that when a <u>REAL</u> alert signal is authorized, sufficient time will be available for every school child to reach his or her home. They calculate a minimum of two hours will be needed to complete such an operation. If sufficient time is not available to send or transport children home, the "Take Cover" signal will be authorized and the entire school population will be evacuated to shelters in the respective schools.

On the <u>Real</u> "alert signal" (3 minutes of steady siren blasts), school buses will transport pupils home in the same manner as they do at regular dismissal times. Pupils not transported by bus will be sent home. There should be ample time for pupils to reach their homes before any <u>Real</u> "take cover" (3 minutes of fluctuating siren blasts) is sounded. These plans apply only to <u>REAL</u> siren signals, and not to tests or exercises, which usually are publicized well in advance of the actual time.

Under no circumstances should parents drive to the schools. Should a child be young or small, parents may if they wish, escort them from the point where the school bus normally transports pupils, but not from any of the schools.

In cases where parents are not likely to be home, they should make prior arrangements for children to go to relatives or neighbors. Children should be instructed of such arrangements.
